Dissertation applications must focus on methodological and research topics that address the mission and research interests of CDC. Research applications must address one of these four goals and reference at least one starter objective. Results should be directly relevant to customers, such as consumers, public health agencies and organizations such as state/local departments of health and community-based organizations, targeted populations, providers and practitioners, administrators, and policymakers. CDC's Health Protection Goals are: 1. Healthy People in Every Stage of Life - All people, and especially those at greater risk of health disparities, will achieve their optimal lifespan with the best possible quality of health in every stage of life. 2. Healthy People in Healthy Places – The places where people live, work, learn, and play will protect and promote their health and safety, especially those at greater risk of health disparities. 3. People Prepared for Emerging Health Threats – People in all communities will be protected from infectious, occupational, environmental, and terrorist threats. 4. Healthy People in a Healthy World - People around the world will live safer, healthier and longer lives through health promotion, health protection, and health diplomacy.
